In a few days we will be celebrating one of the major festivals of the Church, yet few will notice. It is a festival that ranks with Easter, Pentecost, and Christmas as the high feasts of the Church. Yet, again, few will notice. On January 6<sup>th</sup> we will celebrate the Epiphany of Our Lord. Unfortunately we will join the vast majority of Christian congregations and we will not celebrate Epiphany on that date. We will instead wait until the following Sunday and celebrate Epiphany and the Baptism of Our Lord together. This is because Christmas has overtaken one of the most ancient festivals of the Church. Of course it was not the Church that lifted Christmas to a more important level than Epiphany; it was the commercialization of Christmas by our culture. Epiphany is more difficult to capture and to commemorate than the birth of a baby. Epiphany is sort of like Easter; there is simply too much mystery to understand and to commercialize.

Epiphany is a word that means "showing forth" or "manifestation." Twelve days after Christmas Jesus is presented to us as someone who is more than just a baby in a manger. On that day and during the season Jesus is presented to humanity as One who is not only fully human, but is also fully divine. During Epiphany Jesus manifests Himself as the One who is God among us. During this season we are overwhelmed by the truth of the Incarnation— Jesus is indeed God in the flesh. There are three significant events that the Church has historically used to proclaim the presence of God among humanity: the visit of the Magi, the Baptism of Jesus, and the miracle at Cana when Jesus turned water into wine. Through these three lessons we come to see Jesus as God among us who has come

to save the world. It is a season full of mystery. Three Magi, wise men, Gentiles, come from the east and pay homage to the baby. They follow a star to His location. Surly, this is a sign that this baby is of divine origin. The Venerable Bede writes in the 9<sup>th</sup> century about the Magi: The Magi were the ones who gave gifts to the Lord. The first is said to have been Melchoir, and old man with white hair and a long beard...who offered gold to the Lord as to a king. The second, named Gaspar, young and ruddy-complexioned...honored Him as God by his gift of incense, an offering worthy of divinity. The third, black-skinned and heavily bearded, called Balthasar...by his gift of Myrrh testified to the Son of Man who was to die. Surely, this account is not historical, but it does point to the significance of the gifts and is itself a proclamation of the presence of God in the person of Jesus. In the Baptism of Our Lord we read of the descending of the Holy Spirit in the form of a dove and alighting on Jesus. Jesus is the One in whom the Sprit of God swells. We also hear the Word of God spoken after the Baptism-This is My Son. Again, the divinity of Jesus is proclaimed. Finally, we read of Jesus performing the miracle of turning the water into wine. And, again, through this miracle the divinity of Jesus is manifested. As we proceed through the year we now know who Jesus is-Jesus is "very God of very God."

Surely, this celebration does not fit into our world today, a day in which we proclaim that we are all gods, a day of pseudo-mysticism, a day of self-centered relativism. But the Church continues to proclaim that in Jesus we find God, and that only by knowing Jesus can we ever know God. In Epiphany (Continued on following page)

we are reminded once again that God comes to save us and that salvation is God's work alone and it is not our work at all. O One with God the Father In majesty and might, This brightness of His glory, Eternal Light of light. To gloomy haunts of darkness your rays are streaming down; The shadows flee before You, The world's true light has come.

### "Treat the Pantries"

Seven Lutheran congregations recently conducted a special fund drive to benefit the four food pantries serving western Clinton County. This was a Care Abounds in Communities project of the West Clinton County Chapter of Thrivent Financial.

Participating Lutheran congregations were Bethlehem, Lost Nation; Christian Free, Wheatland; Faith and Our Savior's, Calamus; Immanuel, Charlotte; Ascension, Goose Lake; and Grace, DeWitt.

The congregations collected \$1,890 and Thrivent Financial added \$1,600 for a total of \$3,490 to be divided by the food pantries in Lost Nation, Wheatland, Elvira and DeWitt.

Thrivent Financial is a Fortune 500 financial services membership organization helping nearly 3 million members achieve financial security and give back to their congregations and communities.

# At the December Council Meetings

#### **Joint Council:**

- ➤ Pastor Aanonson continues to visit people in nursing homes, hospitals and in their homes.
- ➤ Worship Committee has finalized the Christmas Eve and Christmas Day worship services; Epiphany worship service will be January 11; Ash Wednesday and midweek Lenten services have been planned; no Seder Meal will be held; Early Easter Service will be at Our Savior's followed by breakfast and late service will be at Faith Church.
- > Stewardship and Christian Outreach Committee reported 40 people attended the Thanksgiving Eve Meal with remaining food donated to the Victory Center in Clinton.
- ➤ The Education Committee continues to help the children prepare for the Christmas Program at 10:30 a.m. on Sunday, December 21 at Faith Church.
- ➤ Megan Will agreed to serve on the Call Committee.
- ➤ Three pastoral candidates have submitted their names to receive more information about the parish vacancy pending their continued interest, initial interviews could begin in January or February.
- Annual meetings will be held on January 25 immediately following worship services at each church. No Adult Bible Class will be held that day.
- ➤ The 2015 Budget will be prepared using information compiled for the Pastoral Search. It may require amendment depending on the qualifications of the chosen candidate.

#### **Faith Council:**

- Financial reports were approved with a designated balance of \$965.42 and a working balance of \$26,885.51.
- New electrical panel boxes and wiring have been installed and approved by the state inspector. Continued specific wiring tasks will be done a priority basis with expected completion by the end of January.
- > Two new stoves have been installed in the kitchen.
- > Property and Management Committee is looking of someone to provide snow removal at the church.
- > A new motor and pump have been installed for the church's heating system.

- ➤ The 2015 Thanksgiving Eve Meal may not be held due to low attendance this year alternative methods of providing food to those in need were discussed.
- Faith Council will host the December 17 Advent Meal.

## **Christmas and the Christian life**

Each year in Wittenberg, Germany, Martin Luther preached on the Christmas story and focused his remarks especially on the good news that "to you this day is born a savior." He also noticed how this familiar story could help Christians view their daily lives as a response to God's grace. Here are two examples.

The first compares the town of Bethlehem's lack of care for the holy family with our care for the neighbor.

"There are many of you in this congregation who think to yourselves: 'If only I had been there! How quick I would have been to help the Baby! I would have washed his diapers. How happy I would have been to go with the shepherds to see the Lord lying in the manger!' Yes, you would! You say that because you know how great Christ is, but if you had been there at that time you would have done no better than the people of Bethlehem.

"Childish and silly thoughts are these! Why don't you do it now? You have Christ in your neighbor. You ought to serve him, for what you do to your neighbor in need you do the Lord Christ himself" (Martin Luther's Christmas Book; Augsburg Fortress, page 38).

In the second example Luther, a former Augustinian friar, contrasts the shepherds' return to their God-given vocation (as shepherds) in the world to the human quest for religiously "God-pleasing" works to earn salvation.

"This is wrong. We should correct this passage to read, 'They went and shaved their heads, fasted, told their rosaries and put on cowls.' Instead we read, 'The shepherds returned.' Where to? To their sheep! Oh, that can't be right! Did they not leave everything and follow Christ? Must not one forsake father and mother, wife and child, to be saved?"

"But the Scripture says plainly that they returned and did exactly the same work as before. They did not despise their service, but took it up again where they left off with all fidelity, and I tell you that no bishop on earth ever had so fine a crook as those shepherds" (page 50).

For more of Luther's sermons at Christmas, Augsburg Fortress, Publishers still has in print *Martin Luther's Christmas Book*, edited and translated by Roland Bainton (a Luther scholar who taught for years at Yale University, New Haven, Conn.), from which these excerpts were taken.
